The Strength Of Our End-Time Position

Q #4 Aren't there grounds for rejecting *The Final Trumpet Rapture Gathering* position?

We believe the "final trumpet" of I Corinthians 15 is the "Seventh Trumpet" of Revelation 11. Some have asked, "On what grounds do you believe this given the difficulties tied to this position?" We have already made reference to the *who/Who* it is who blows the trumpet in a prior question (Q#1). This more thorough response seeks to demonstrate there is indeed warrant for the possibility of equating the two trumpets mentioned above. We've chosen to address the question by beginning with the "whys" some have given for "rejecting" the possibility. Here are the reasons some have given against equating the "final trumpet" of 1 Corinthians 15 with the "seventh trumpet" of Revelation 11:

According to those who reject our position:

Mt. 24:29-31 teaches Jesus will come with His angels, a coming that includes a trumpet blast.

Revelation chronology says Matthew 24:29-31 will happen <u>after</u> the 7 trumpets.

Paul, in the book of I Corinthians, was writing before the Book of Revelation had been written.

Our response to their arguments:

We agree, but we go on to ADD: the passage also includes the event of the gathering (of God's elect in Jesus Christ - vs. 31).

We do not find this teaching stated in God's Word--the Book of Revelation, included.

We agree, but we do not believe this substantiates the author's conclusions that Paul could not have meant the 7th Trumpet of Revelation. Progressive revelation of the New Testament canon should be considered, not to mention: Whose revelation is it?

According to those who reject our position:

Our response to their arguments:

There will be trumpet blasts which follow the "final trumpet."

We agree (though not with the same degree of conviction as some hold), but we define the eschatological "final trumpet" in a way that affirms the analogy of Scripture.

"Trumpet blasts" (plural usage) do not equate to "a trumpet blast" (singular usage).

We agree, but we are simply saying it is the 7th Trumpet of Revelation that is the "final trumpet" of I Cor. 15.

(The above reasons for rejecting our position are summarized in the book by Dr. Renald Showers titled, *Maranatha: Our Lord Come!* 1995. pp. 159-169.) Given our responses above, there is not sufficient warrant to reject the possibility that the "final trumpet" of I Corinthians 15 is the "seventh trumpet" of Revelation 11. We would ask you to further consider the proposal, especially in light of the full Counsel of the Word of God. The analogy of Scripture is indeed an important hermeneutical consideration.
